All these societies are worldwide organizations working in 139 countries of the world. Don Bosco Society began its work in India in 1906 and has now more than 333 centre taking care of the poor and abandoned.

Our sole objective is to empower children and the Young at Risk with vocational and life skills. Our Center is an embodiment of the Don Bosco International Society.

The Society in India has primary and secondary schools, colleges, formal and informal technical institutes, agriculture schools, social work centers, mass media cum communication centres serving different categories of children and the Young at Risk- Street children, slum children and drug addicts etc.

Don Bosco Navjeevan Society was set up in the year 2001 with an objective to cater to the poor and needy from the slums in the city of Chandigarh. The organization was resigtered under Societies Act of XXI in 2008. The focus of Don Bosco Navjeevan Society is to reach out to more and more needy children and youth in the Streets, slums and villages, improve the quality of life of the unfortunate ones, empower the women in the slums and villages through Mahila Mandals and Self Help Groups and life skill programmes. EDUCATION

Remedial Classes

Remedial classes are tuition classes conducted for children who are living in slums and colonies of Chandigarh and are going to the government schools. These centres are located in different slums and colonies. There are ten such centres and in each centre we have 30 students. Children from classes 6,7 and 8 attend these classes. In addition to the academic studies it lays an important foundation in developing skills such as turn taking, staying safe, communication, leadership and conflict resolving. All these skills enable children to be more responsible.








Various interventions done at the remedial classes:

- 1. Tuition for various school subjects
- 2. Providing nutrition to these children
- 3. Providing monthly medical checkups.
- 4. Sports and co-curricular activities
- 5. Excursion
- 6. Personality and leadership quality development through Child Parliament
- 7. Annual and Cultural day celebration.
- 8. Providing them with school stationeries and uniform
- 9. Every centre has a teacher who is graduate pass



Non-Formal Education-Nios

- NIOS is a platform through which Don Bosco Navjeevan Society provides an opportunity to drop out students to complete their secondary and senior secondary education via open schooling
- Number of students enrolled in NIOS with the help of Don Bosco are 87 (Combined students of secondary and senior secondary classes)
- ♦ Don Bosco Navjeevan Society provides 5 day classes to students and 1 day extracurricular activities
- Students are evaluated on the basis of yearly exams conducted by NIOS, so for preparing students for these exams quarterly exams are conducted by Don Bosco.



This undergraduate degree allows students to tailor their education, fostering a personalized and impactful learning experience.
- ❖ A notable feature is the program's steadfast commitment to empowering underprivileged communities, particularly focusing on the education of girls to combat gender inequality. Despite challenges presented by the pandemic, enrolment surged to 75 students in 2022, showcasing resilience and dedication.
- The program tackles a crucial issue in slum areas where parents traditionally resist educating their girls, emphasizing household activities over formal education. Overcoming this mindset has been a formidable task, demanding community mobilization efforts to underscore the importance of education for their children's future.

❖ Looking forward to 2023, the program achieved a remarkable enrolment of 113 students, a testament to two years of unwavering commitment. The Don Bosco Navjeevan Society's dedication continues to profoundly impact the underprivileged, equipping students, particularly girls, to shape their futures and contribute positively to society—a transformative journey towards a brighter and more equitable future.





WOMEN EMPOWERMENT AND LIVELIHOOD

- Self-Help Groups (SHGs) are self-governed informal associations of individuals who voluntarilycome together with the shared goal of enhancing their living conditions.
- SHGs operate based on the principle of "Self-help," emphasizing self-employment and poverty alleviation.
- DBNS initiated the formation of SHGs in January 2020, meticulously selecting underprivileged colonies in Chandigarh. The organization identified individuals, particularly women, to bring together for the purpose of SHG formation.
- As of the conclusion of 2023, DBNS has successfully established 54 SHGs in 10 chosen colonies within Chandigarh.

Skill Training

- DBNS put emphasis on skill development of the SHG women through well-designed training courses.
- The interested members were short listed for giving different skill trainings.
- The design, duration and the curriculum were modified to meet the needs of the selected members

- Special trainers were hired for training. DBNS is trying hard to provide marketing support to the SHGs.
- Objective of trainings is to provide skill development support to the unemployed women in the slums and colonies for sustainable livelihood.
- Practical skill trainings were being held for the SHG ladies in different areas on **Dona** making, paper conversion Trainings etc. where material and trainer were provided to the
 ladies by Don Bosco.

Neha Kumari, a tenacious and resourceful 35-year-old woman, courageously challenged societal norms that confined her within the walls of her home, preventing her from pursuing work outside. Undeterred by these constraints, Neha made a resolute choice to seek independence and empowerment. Joining the Self-Help Group (SHG) named SWABHIMAAN Proved to be a pivotal turning point in her life. Under the auspices of The Don Bosco Navjeevan Society, Neha underwent comprehensive training in the art of candle making, a skill that would ultimately become her means of financial independence.

Despite facing initial challenges, Neha exhibited unwavering commitment and determination within the supportive environment of the SHG. Upon mastering the intricacies of candle making, she ventured into crafting exquisite handmade candles, which she successfully introduced to the market. In the previous year alone, her entrepreneurial spirit bore fruit, yielding an impressive income of 10,000 INR from the sale of her unique creations.

Neha's journey did not end with her personal success; she extended her newfound expertise by offering candle-making training to school students. Over a 15-day period, she not only imparted valuable skills but also earned recognition and compensation, receiving 300 INR per hour for her contributions. Her ability to transform adversity into triumph has made Neha Kumari a beacon of inspiration within the SWABHIMAAN SHG and beyond.

The Don Bosco Society played a pivotal role in empowering Neha, enabling her to break free from societal constraints and become a self-reliant individual. Her narrative serves as a testament to the transformative impact of SHGs and vocational training programs, illustrating how they can empower women to overcome challenges, pursue entrepreneurship, and serve as catalysts for positive change within their communities. Health & Nutrition

Medical check-up camps

Don Bosco Navjeevan Society has successfully extended vital health services to children, women, and others in the colonies of Chandigarh. Conducting impactful medical camps, the initiative boasts a dedicated team of doctors, nurses, pharmacists, lab technicians, drivers, and a fully-equipped mobile ambulance. These camps focus on providing essential medical aid, empowering residents in specific areas to access healthcare independently. Beyond immediate care, the initiative aims to heighten awareness about the community's entitlement to government-provided medical facilities. In 2023, we continued these efforts, fostering collaborations with government hospitals through networking, and actively engaged in campaigns to identify and prevent potential cases of anemia, ensuring a lasting positive impact.

HEALTH AWARENESS TALKS

FAMILY COUNSELLING CENTRE

Our counseling initiatives are meticulously crafted to cater to the diverse needs of students through individual and group sessions. With a special focus on children with special needs, tailored sessions for remedial students encompass academic and personal growth. Comprehensive counseling extends to students from NIOS, skill-based programs, and B.A. courses, covering career guidance and mental health support. This pivotal role inspires, motivates, and addresses specific concerns, fostering empowerment.

The core objective is to help students navigate educational challenges by discussing academic hurdles, strengths, weaknesses, and mental health. Beyond academics, counseling addresses career planning and personal development, creating a supportive environment for self-awareness and decision-making skills.

Adapting to evolving student needs, our initiatives ensure sustained positive outcomes, contributing to overall well-being and success. Individual counseling, addressing academic, personal, and emotional challenges, is complemented by group counseling, fostering a supportive community within classes. The tailored approach recognizes diverse contexts, providing targeted support and contributing to each class's overall well-being and success. In 2023, identified cases ranged from career counseling to family maladjustments, showcasing the program's adaptability and impact.

CHILD FRIENDLY CITY INITIATIVE

A child-friendly city aims to guarantee children's rights to essential services, such as health, education, shelter, safe water and decent sanitation, and protection from violence, abuse and exploitation. It also seeks to empower young citizens to influence decisions making in their city, express their opinion on the city they want, and participate in family community and social life. It promotes children's rights to walk safely in the streets by themselves, meet friends and play, live in an unpolluted environment with green spaces, participate in cultural and social events and be an equal citizen of their city with access to every service, without discrimination of any kind.

Child Friendly City Initiative, Chandigarh was inaugurated in April 2018 by H.E. Sh. V. P. Singh Badnore, Governor of Punjab and Administrator, U.T. Chandigarh. Last three years this Child Friendly City Initiative has been running. A strong network of stakeholders has been built up. It is a collaborative work of children, NGOs, civil society and various departments of administration. More than 45 active child parliaments have been formed and Federation of Child Parliament, Chandigarh has been formed. Child Friendly City Initiative has helped in the promotion of child rights in the city. It is an initiative which is really helping children and the society.

Success Story of Babita

"Live as if you were to die tomorrow. Learn as if you were to live forever." — Mahatma Gandhi. In the heart of Faidan Nizampur, the largest slum in Chandigarh, lives Babita, whose determination and resilience shine like a beacon of hope in the midst of challenging circumstances. Babita's family story is one of migration and tenacity. Originally hailing from a remote village in Uttar Pradesh, her father embarked on a journey to Chandigarh two decades ago in search of employment. Over time, he settled as a slum dweller in Faidan Nizampur, where he, along with his wife, his daughter Babita and his son, resides in a modest rented semi-mud house. The family's living conditions are humble, with all members sharing a single room. Babita's father works as a plumber and uses the other room to store his tools.

She joined remedial centre in 2016 when she was in 4th class. Since then, she is associated with Don Bosco. After looking at her journey she was given best student award in 2019. Despite the

challenges posed by their living conditions, Babita is a student who wholeheartedly embraces education. At the age of 16, Babita is a remarkable student studying in class 11 in Arts stream at Govt. Model Senior Secondary School, Sector 32, Chandigarh.

She is part of Don Bosco Child Parliament since its inception in 2018. Her journey from being a member of chid parliament to becoming national Prime Minister is incredible. In 2018, she became a member of the children's parliament under the Child Friendly City Initiative Chandigarh. Babita's commitment led to her election as the Chief Minister of Mother Teresa Children's Parliament in Faidan Nizampur. Since then, she has been actively engaging parents in her locality, raising awareness about child rights, ensuring birth registration, and facilitating the issuance of Aadhaar cards for children to secure their right to education. Her advocacy for children's rights continues as she was elected Deputy Prime Minister of the Federation of Child Parliaments Chandigarh in June 2022.

National Inclusive Children Parliament was conducted from January 24th to 31st 2024. Children from across 75 parliamentary constituencies attended this event at National Capital. Babita Devi, went to the event to represent Chandigarh parliament constituency.

In this immersive week-long program, children were engaged in various activities, ranging from comprehensive Child Rights training and in-depth sessions on United Nations Sustainable Development Goals, climate change and steps for advocacy.

Apart from learning sessions, elections were held for National Children's Parliament. During the process, the child parliamentarians elected their National Prime Minister and other key leaders. Babita Devi from Don Bosco Navjeevan Society was elected as Prime Minister. All other child members were assigned as Union, State and other ministers on each of the 17 UN Sustainable Development Goals and the campaign's additional 18th goal called "All Rights for All Children. She, along with other parliamentarians, went to Shri Francisco Sardinha, MP Lok Sabha (Former Chief Minister of Goa), seeking the adoption of their Children's Manifesto into their Party Manifesto.

Her story is a testament to the power of determination, education, and the drive to make a positive impact in the lives of those less fortunate. Babita is not only a promising student but also a beacon of hope, a leader in her community and an inspiration for all of us.





INJECTING DRUG USERS PROJECT

In collaboration with Punjab State Aids Control Society, Don Bosco Navjeevan Society is running two IDU projects in Tran Taran and Moga. About 1100 addicts are being treated and helped out through these two centres. It is supported by Punjab government. However, Don Bosco wants to start a de addiction centre and create awareness among the youth of Punjab about the evil effects of Drug abuse.





SPORTS AND MUSIC ACADEMIES:

In order to keep the children healthy and to keep away from evil habits and to develop the latents Don Bosco has initiated a sports academy in sector 47 D and a music academy in sector 24. More than 40 children are benefitting from these academies.
